

Soroptimists in Romania aim:


- to share the experience and best practice gained through various activities and projects in their tireless work for improving the lives of women and girls.




 Maria BAIULESCU, born in Brasov, (August 1860 – June 1941) r. was a Romanian author, suffragist, women's rights activist, Romanian nationalist, and feminist leade

Influenced by her energetic mother and getting a good education, she fought for women to have equal rights as men. She founded an organization known as the Association of Romanian women's Civil & Political Emancipation through which she helped women practice their political rights.

She also established another organization known as The Union of the Romanian Women, fund a girls' orphanage, supported girls' education, child care and protection in all ways including public conferences; she also kept Romanian culture alive translating from French & English, writing prose and poems, publishing in magazines etc.



- Raluca RIPAN, (n. June, 27 1894, Iaşi d. December 5, 1975, Cluj-Napoca) chemist, inventor, the first woman dean in Romania.
- Full member of the Romanian Academy since November 2, 1948, president of the Cluj-Napoca Branch of the Romanian Academy. doctor honoris causa of the "Nikolaus Kopernicus" University of Torun (Poland), honorary member of the Society of Industrial Chemistry in France, as well as of the German Society of Chemistry.
- The first woman doctor in chemistry in Romania trained in Romanian interwar education, Raluca Ripan contributed to the development of chemistry in our country.

- Smaranda GHEORGHIU (5 October 1857 26 January 1944) was a Romanian poet, novelist, essayist, playwright, educator, feminist and traveler.
- She wrote under a number of pseudonyms and is perhaps best known under the moniker *Maica Smara* (*Mother Smara*), which was given to her by Veronica Micle


Ecaterina TEODOROIU, born Cătălina Toderoiu (January 15, 1894 – September 3, 1917) was a Romanian woman who fought and died in World War I, and is regarded as a heroine of Romania.

- Aurelia GROSU, famous woman in Olt-SLATINA, contemporary with us.
- Strong personality, she was born on September 1, 1952 in Călinești, Argeș but she carried out her prodigious scientific and civic activity in Slatina, Olt, as a historian, doctor in archeology and Director of the Museum of History and Art.
- She published 7 specialized books, monographs (Căluiu and Brancoveni monastery) articles and studies in specialized magazines, made 3 documentaries and 250 TV shows "Footprints" about the history of the city, heritage houses and families who lived there
